You know it's cold when the Brass Monkeys are knocking at the kitchen door every half hour asking for thermal Long Johns and a hot water bottle. Well, Cold it most certainly is at the moment. But Cold is exactly what we season-hardened allotmenteers need right now.

We've had far too many namby-pamby Winters of late when the temperature has struggled to fall below thirty degrees, meaning the whitefly, blackfly, greenfly and every-other-coloured-fly has been able to add to their numbers throughout the year without being troubled by the odd spot of Arctic

conditions. And the soft fruit needs to be chilled this time of year, too, to poke

their fruiting tips

into some sort of action ahead of the coming Summer.

I have a confession to make. I've barely been up to the plot since the end of November. In my defence, M'Lud, I plead mitigating circumstances that I'd pretty much put everything to bed by the end of November. Raspberries (Summer fruiting) are tied in closer and more neatly than a haberdasher's window display and raspberries (Winter fruiting) are all tucked up within a couple of inches of the mulch around them.

I've left the asparagus this far, in the past two years I've cut the year's top growth off in September but this time I've decided to follow Home Farm Nacton's lead and leave the chopping and chipping until they get round to it in the fields around Bucklesham and Newbourne, on the basis that they know far more about timings than I do. I've taken the Lazy Route and put my customary weed control fabric down across much of the plot. Yes, I know that takes away all the fun of Autumn digging and Spring weeding, but I'm at that stage in life that appreciates things like the TV remote and an automatic gearbox on the car. I look at it this way... there's things I need to keep my energy for and things I don't.

I'm told by my Ears and Eyes on the Ground that my new strawberry bed is flourishing. I'd planted two new beds last Spring with Cambridge Favourite and Elsanta, however by the Autumn every single one of the forty-odd plants had decided to shuffle off their mortal coil, to join the Great Compost Bin In The Sky.

No, I have absolutely no idea why, however the Cambridge Favourite's foliage was absolutely shredded of anything vaguely green and by October resembled one of those copper filigree "works of art" that gift shops ask you to pay £99 for, when they have been piece-worked by a two-and-a-half year old at nursery school.

In October I planted up another bed, with Allegro and Marshmello purchased from our good friends at

willingness to throw off the odd 40 ft container-full of fruit per square foot in a half-decent Summer. We'll see how they go, but initial signs are positive.

I've been uncharacteristically gung-ho with the new plants this time, in that I've set them straight out onto the plot, rather than molly-coddling them over Winter in the greenhouse. Tough Love maybe, but they don't call me Monty the Merciless for nothing!!

I'm waiting at the moment for delivery of my seed potatoes. This year I'm only growing Jazzy and Orla. Both hold RHS Award of Garden Merit status and both have performed exceptionally well for me in previous years. For the first time, I'm not planning to produce enough spuds to keep Mrs Monty and I in the carbohydrates to which we've become accustomed next Winter – like a fair few allotmenteers, I've found that my plot is way bigger than my belly (although this point is currently subject to fact-checking by Mrs Monty!).

No, I'll grow sufficient for us to enjoy the incomparable taste of newly-dug potatoes from late Spring to late Summer, and then pop into Phoenix Fruiterers and see John and Jo for our spuds beyond this.

Very best wishes to all allotmenteers for 2025... may our plots forever be a sanctuary from the utter, unbounded madness of the world around us.
